Secondly : Health Attestation

II.1. Health attestation

I, the undersigned official veterinarian certify that:

II.1.1. The falcons have been kept in a breeding establishment approved by the competent authority for that purpose on the territory of the exporting country for at least 21 days or since hatching. or

The falcons are from Country has no record of the highly pathogenic avian Influenza was not recorded in domesticated birds and in captive birds for at least 12 months prior to export in accordance the published animal health reports, or for at least 28 days prior to export in a condition of applying a stamping-out policy,

II.1.2. The falcons are captive bred (the falcons have not been caught in the wild and have been born and bred in captivity from parents that mated or had gametes otherwise transferred in captivity).

II.1.3. The falcons described in point I.22 have been subjected either today, within 48 hours, or on the last working day prior to dispatch, to a clinical inspection and found free of obvious signs of disease.

II.1.4. Newcastle Disease and avian influenza in poultry and other falcons kept in captivity are notifiable diseases.

II.1.5. The falcons come from a holding, which is not under animal health restrictions in connection with any diseases referred to in II.1.4.

II.1.10. The falcons have vaccinated against the following diseases within 6 months prior to importation:

II.2. Transport of the falcons II.2.1. In case of CITES-listed species the falcons will be transported according to 'CITES guidelines for transport'.

II.2.2. The falcons described in this certificate are transported in crates or cages, which:

- b) designed in manner that protects feathers and permit cleaning ,
- c) easy to disinfection and allow visual inspection,
- d) in case of air transport the IATA standard are applied.
